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### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

The charity is dedicated to conserving birds and their habitats across the continent of Africa and related islands. Our purpose is also to further ornithology in this region. We are the leading organisation concerned with the conservation and study of African birds.

The activities that the charity undertakes in relation to its charitable purposes for the public benefit include making grants to local people and groups in support of a wide range of projects that benefit the conservation of birds and their habitats across continental Africa and related islands. We also collaborate with partners on conservation efforts in the region for the benefit of African birds and people.

The charity in addition provides a worldwide focus for African ornithology and fosters interest in African birds and their conservation by:

- producing and distributing a peer-reviewed bulletin and a members' e-newsletter twice a year
- providing resources online
- developing birding apps and making these accessible to everyone
- sponsoring the Pan-African Ornithological Congress (PAOC)
- putting on talks by invited speakers on relevant topics
- having an active presence on social media
- exhibiting at bird fairs

We also raise awareness of African conservation issues and threats, and throw our weight behind other organisations' campaigns, where this would promote the conservation of African birds and their habitats.

Membership of the charity is open to anyone who is interested in what we do, and it is free for those living in an African country who take an active interest in African birds and their conservation but cannot afford annual membership fees. These supported members are partly subsidised by supporting members of the charity, who pay an increment on top of their individual membership fees.

A network of voluntary representatives in countries in Africa and elsewhere that the charity coordinates act as our eyes and ears on the ground and provide a local point of contact and channel of communication for members in their country. They also pay an important role locally in promoting the charity, recruiting new members and supporters, identifying conservation projects that are suitable for funding by the charity, and highlighting conservation issues and threats that we can raise awareness of.

The charity's current five-year strategy includes several high-level outcomes that we will seek by 2025, for each of which we have identified the major actions we would need to take to achieve them. The trustees confirm that they have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit when reviewing the charity's objectives and in planning its future activities.

### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Achievements and performance

During 2022 the charity raised over £44,000 to fund 12 conservation awards, one expedition award and one ongoing project, bringing the total grants made by the charity since our Conservation Fund was set up in 1996 to more than £550,000. The 12 conservation awards were made to local grantees carrying out worthwhile projects in Angola, Benin, Cameroon, Kenya, Madagascar, Rwanda, Tanzania and Zimbabwe. The expedition award was made in support of an important project in São Tomé and Príncipe, which was carried out with substantial local participation.

The ongoing project for which funds were raised in 2022 was in Angola. We brokered a four-year project agreement between the World Land Trust and our local partner, Fundação Kissama, to fund the protection of Afromontane forest at Mount Moco, for which we also continued to collect funds on behalf of our partner. All funds raised were spent in Angola, mostly on employing local community members to plant trees and burn firebreaks.

Our partnership with the Birdsong Project culminated in them releasing a best-selling music album in 2022 featuring tracks by local artists inspired by the sounds of 10 threatened birds of western Africa, which we had helped our partner to select. We also connected our partner with local organisations working to protect some of those birds - the Nigerian Bird Atlas Project, the Gulf of Guinea Biodiversity Center and Association Nature Koussabel in Senegal - all of which benefited from funds raised from sales of the album.

We produced and distributed two issues of the Bulletin of the African Bird Club, in March and October 2022, providing a forum for news and comment as well as publication of studies and records of African birds by contributors from all over the world. We also produced and distributed two e-newsletters, in June and December 2022, keeping our members up to date with the charity's activities during the year.

The charity's revamped website was launched in 2022. This boasts all-new country accounts for every country and territory of the region covered by the charity, as well as a comprehensive video library. Most of the content that was on the old website has been reviewed, reorganised and updated. We have also made it simpler (with an improved interface) to securely donate to and join the charity, and for members to renew their membership, online. Visitors can now sustainably shop online for t-shirts and tote bags branded with the charity's logo. The charity makes a small profit on each item we sell, which all goes into our Conservation Fund.

We continued to make good progress on expanding and improving the charity's free field guide app - Birds of Africa - which by the end of 2022 included over 2,300 bird species on the checklists of 41 countries in West, East and Southern Africa. The app will eventually cover all the birds and countries of continental Africa and related islands. Our objective from the outset was and still is for the app to be accessible to all who want it. There have been around 20,000 downloads of the app to date. The development of the app has been made possible because of the work of volunteers in many countries and those who have provided generous financial and content support.

The charity was a sponsor of the postponed 15th Pan-African Ornithological Congress (PAOC15), which took place in Victoria Falls, Zimbabwe, in November 2022. Close to 300 delegates from around 60 countries took part. Among them were representatives of the charity who attended at their own expense. The charity raised funds to sponsor five researchers from different African countries to attend and present their work at PAOC15. We also funded the printing of the PAOC15 programme and the preparation and translation of the abstract booklet. The Chair of the charity showcased what we do in a short plenary talk and offered free membership of the charity to all eligible PAOC15 participants, 45 of whom took up his offer. We also had a stand at PAOC15 which provided a focal point for networking. It was especially pleasing to meet in person with four former trustees of the charity, three members of our conservation committee, no fewer than 13 of our country representatives and many grantees, some of whose projects the charity has supported featured in oral or poster presentations at PAOC15. There were also round-table discussions, including one on the charity's free Birds of Africa app among other birding apps.

We ran more online talks by invited speakers on topics related to African ornithology and conservation during 2022. These virtual presentations continue to enable a broader section of the charity's membership to participate. We also maintained an active presence on social media. By the end of the year, our Facebook community had over 10,000 members, our Twitter (now X) handle had over 1,500 followers and the charity also had a LinkedIn account.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

## **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

The charity was once again a virtual exhibitor at the African Bird Fair, which was a hybrid event in July 2022. In the same month the charity was an exhibitor at the first Global Birdfair, which was held in the UK at Rutland Showground. We met many members and other visitors to our stand, where we showcased our work and sold some merchandise, and made several new connections as well.

We welcomed more supported members but lost some fee-paying members during 2022. By the end of the year the charity still had around 1,200 members in total from more than 70 countries across the world. We also welcomed Zeiss as a new corporate sponsor whilst we continued to miss the valuable support of other corporate sponsors whose sponsorship we had agreed to put on hold because of the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on their business.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### Financial review

The total income for the charity was £82,557 (2021: £77,193). The significant components of this income can be found in notes 2 and 3 on page 10 of these accounts.

Total expenditure on charitable activities was £86,400 (2021: £91,178). The main items of expenditure were grants to individuals and institutions totalling £44,806 (2021: £41,252).

#### Reserves policy

The trustees continue to maintain their policy where a financial reserve equivalent to at least 50% of anticipated annual income should be held. At this level the trustees feel that they would be able to continue the current activities of the charity in the event of a significant drop in funding or increase in expenditure. It would obviously be necessary to consider how the funding would be replaced or activities changed accordingly should such an event occur.

Our reserves are held in accounts with Barclays Bank plc and Triodos Bank UK Ltd.

## STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### Governing document

The charity is controlled by its constitution.

### **Charity constitution**

The charity is constituted as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) with voting members other than its trustees, and its governing document is a CIO association model constitution.

## Decision making

The charity is managed on a voluntary basis by a board of trustees, known as Council, who are elected by members at the AGM. The trustees are responsible for the day-to-day running of the charity, and Council meets three times a year.

#### Risk management

The charity has put in place systems to mitigate the major risks to which it is exposed. Internal risks are minimised by the implementation of effective internal control procedures which ensure both appropriate authorisation of all transactions and projects and consistent quality of delivery for all operational aspects of the charity. These procedures are reviewed periodically by Council to ensure their continuing effectiveness.

## 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Display stand - 25% on cost

## Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

## Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
